#### Hi everyone,

Spring is here, and it's a great time to get outside and enjoy our parks, forests, lakes and town centres. This May marks the 80th anniversary of VE day. This spring we welcome Claire Hamilton, our new Chief Executive (an East London resident) and say a huge thank you to Adrian Loades who leaves us after eight years of service, who most recently stepped in as our Interim Chief Executive.

We have been independently recognised as being the most efficient council in London and the second most efficient in the country. This means we make every penny count across 400+ highguality services. We're building 600 council homes, have 9 Green Flag award-winning parks and 96% of our schools are rated good or outstanding by Ofsted. Our children's services are rated outstanding across the board - one of only three councils in the country to achieve this.

I know there's still more to do, and I challenge teams across the council to deliver even more for local people every day. Redbridge is the fourthlowest funded London borough per person. I know how this impacts us as a borough and I will keep pushing the government to get the funding we deserve.

Our achievements are a team effort, and we all play a part in keeping Redbridge clean, safe, and healthy. Being civic-minded - whether by recycling, volunteering, or helping a neighbour - strengthens our community. If we see fly-tipping, littering, or anti-social behaviour, we should report or challenge it. Small actions add up, and together we can build a better Redbridge.

# Budget 25/26: Keeping services going despite funding challenges


### We're continuing to invest in services most valued by local people to help make the borough an even better place to live

Redbridge has shown remarkable resilience in the face of enormous funding cuts over the past year, and although our finances are challenging, we are sticking with our weekly bin collections and keeping our 11 libraries open. The services you value are here to stay.

Since 2010, Central Government has reduced our grant funding by more than 54p for every £1, which means we have £150 million less to spend to spend on local services each year.

We've seen the demand for social care for our most vulnerable residents climb to an all-time high while the housing crisis shows no sign of easing anytime soon. 3000 households are living in temporary accommodation, and 8,000 are on a waiting list for council homes.

Deputy Leader of the Council, and Cabinet Member for Finance, Cllr Vanisha Solanki said:



continues to fund the services you care about. We are efficient

with the budget we do have, and have been recognised for this by independent organisation, IMPOWER, who ranked us 2nd in the country for our spending efficiency. Moreover, we are committed to investing in new leisure facilities to serve people now and for future generations, and that will provide an income to the Council into the future, supporting our core services."

#### **Cllr Kam Rai**, Leader of Redbridge Council, said:

"Redbridge is the fourth lowestfunded council in London, yet we face the same issues as many inner

London councils. Imagine the difference it could make if we received the average funding across London. We would have an additional £68m annually for local services, which could significantly improve the quality of life for our residents."

"In Redbridge, we get through together, and as a borough we're fortunate to have hundreds of volunteers who dedicate their time to making Redbridge a better place. We are supporting these fantastic volunteers and helping to inspire more local people to get involved to help keep our neighbourhoods clean and tidy and to look after each other. (page 18). By sharing responsibility and supporting each other in our communities, we can all help keep Redbridge a fantastic place in which to live."



### Year-round water fun at Valentines lido

We're building a state-of-the-art lido in Valentines Park that will be open all year round – the first to be built in London in decades.

You'll be able to have a gentle swim, play in the splash area, or increase your stamina in the six-lane, 25 metre pool that will be open all year round. A café will offer warm drinks in winter and cool refreshments in summer, and there will be a dance and exercise studio for those who want to stay fit. The lido will be cost-effective and energy-efficient, providing a great space for local people to stay active, connect with others, and enjoy a healthier lifestyle – no matter the season.

The centre will create jobs for local people, give people a taster of a fast-growing sport, and offer people a place where they can develop new skills.



# Exploring the Rich History of our Borough

# Happy 60th birthday, Redbridge

Did you know that the London Borough of Redbridge was established 60 years ago on 1 April 1965? And did you know the origin of the name Redbridge?

Before this, Redbridge was made up of two separate boroughs in the County of Essex: the borough of Ilford and the borough of Wanstead and Woodford. Aside from being next to each other, the two areas had little to do with one another.

In 1961, the Government decided that London should be divided into 33 boroughs of similar population size. Each borough would have its own council, giving them more power and control of public spending for their residents.

After much discussion about which areas should join together, between Ilford, Dagenham, Chigwell, Wanstead, Woodford, Leyton and Walthamstow, it was decided for Wanstead and Woodford to form a new borough with Ilford and Hainault which was transferred from the former Chigwell Council.

A joint committee of Council members from Ilford, and Wanstead and Woodford, was set up in 1963 to oversee the smooth merger of the two boroughs. According to local newspapers, there were several disagreements, including what to call the new borough.

Eventually the name 'Redbridge' was chosen. The original Red Bridge (so-called because it was made of red bricks) joined Ilford to Wanstead and Woodford, across the River Roding. The new name therefore symbolised the unity of the two boroughs as it strived to become one new community.

In the 60 years since its creation, Redbridge has developed its own identity. We have a diverse and connected community who come together to celebrate and support one another.

We have outstanding schools, colleges and adult education facilities for children and adults to learn and grow. As a place where the city meets the country, we have award winning green spaces for our local community and visitors to enjoy.

### Meet Shagufta Asam – the big-hearted mum who was awarded an MBE for fostering Redbridge children over three decades.



Over 33 years, Shagufta Asam has fostered hundreds of children, giving some of the borough's most vulnerable children a safe, supportive and loving home. Her dedication to fostering was thrust into the spotlight in a monumental way this year when she was honoured with an MBE from the King, in his New Year Honours list.

This inspiring, big-hearted mum from Ilford said "My husband would go to the local mosque and there was always talk about the need for carers for children, so we decided to do something about it. That was in 1991 – and the rest is history! Although I had my own young family at the time, I felt I wouldn't be taking on more than what I was already doing anyway. We always knew we wanted to open up our home to other children and my own children were very accepting of it and enjoy having an extended family."



At the moment, she is foster mum to three teenage boys, but over the decades Shagufta has taken in and cared for children ranging from babies to late teens, some as emergency overnight placements, and many for longer-term stays.

"My first ever foster child was a baby boy we collected straight from the hospital. We looked after him for a year and half before he was adopted, and we have stayed in touch with him to this day. He's all grown up now and living a good life in Australia – it makes me so proud that we could play a role in giving him a good start in life." said Shagufta.

"I feel like I have children all over the world. It's an amazing feeling knowing how well they are all doing. Fostering is something I'm incredibly proud of – it brings so much happiness into our lives." In a heartfelt endorsement of her dedication to fostering, one of her current foster children touchingly added **"She's a kind and supportive foster mum, and always has** good advice when I need it. When I first came to the family Shagufta knew I had a big interest in football and signed me up to local clubs to help me settle in and develop my interests. She is an amazing person, and what she does changes lives. She makes me a better person and encourages me to be the best version of myself."

Encouraging others to start their own fostering journey Shagufta said "If you're thinking about fostering – just go for it. It's an amazing thing to do and can be lifechanging not just for the child, but for you too. All you need is a spare room, the heart to do it and time. It can feel hard at times, but that's just parenting in general! Being a foster carer brings so much joy and happiness to your life - seeing your foster kids thrive, stand on their own two feet and succeed in life brings meaning to everything you do."

Holi, the Hindu festival of colours, celebrates spring and the triumph of good over evil. People throw colourful powders, sing, and dance in joyous festivities. Join the celebrations at

Hainault Skate Park & **Recreational Ground** on Saturday, 15 March, from 12pm to 8pm.

Ramadan is set to begin on 28 February, depending on the sighting of the crescent moon. It is a time of reflection, kindness, and generosity. Many Muslims fast from sunrise to sunset, aiming to become closer to god through reflection. Mosques hold special prayers throughout the month, with recitations from the

Qur'an. Ramadan ends with Eid

ul-Fitr, a joyful festival marked

by feasts and gatherings.



### Vaisakhi

Vaisakhi marks the birth of the Khalsa in 1699 when Guru Gobind Singh Ji transformed Sikhs into a warrior-saint community. Sikhs celebrate with prayers, initiations, and Nagar Kirtan processions, featuring martial arts and community food distribution.

Preparations often begin six weeks before, during the season of Lent (meaning lengthen, for the longer days of Spring) when Christians fast, help others and attend services. Easter Sunday on 20 April 2025, marks remembrance of Jesus Christ's death and resurrection, is celebrated through church services, meals, and chocolate

egg hunts.

Passover is a celebration of the story of Exodus. During Passover, Jews remember how their ancestors left slavery behind them when they were led out of Egypt by Moses. On the evening before Passover starts, Jews have a special service called a Seder (Order). During the meal, the story of Exodus is told from a book called the Haggadah

# Helping each other reduce plastic

Redbridge local, Zuzana Ravasova, is passionate about waste reduction and started One Planet, a zero-waste refill shop in South Woodford. She helps people make small changes to reduce their use of plastic.

Zuzana's top tip "I found cleaning products were the easiest. When I used up a bottle, I set it aside and at the end of the week I took it to the refill shop and refilled it. You can't stop using all plastic immediately, it would be too hard, which is only because the convenience plays a big part in our life - but we can start making little changes that lead to bigger changes."


# What's on our doorstep



Come with us as we explore Redbridge's town centres. In this edition, we're heading to Woodford.

Woodford is full of history, you can feel it as you walk through the area, and pass landmarks like the White House – originally built in 1906 but now home to Haven House hospice, and the Woodford Parish Church Memorial Hall, which opened in 1902. The Hall was opened in 1902 and continues to hold a wide variety of community events today.

On the land behind it was the childhood home of writer, William Morris, who lived there in the 1800s. Woodford has been home to other notable figures, including Winston Churchill, who served as MP for the area from 1924 to 1964, and suffragette Sylvia Pankhurst, who lived on Charteris Road near Woodford Station for over 30 years. A memorial of her still stands nearby.

Keith, pictured in front of Woodford Green's village pipe which was renovated in 1991 but dates back over 100 years, said "It's a great place to live. There are lots of reasonably priced restaurants, a pharmacy and doctors' surgery all within a stone's throw from my house."



This rich history is also reflected in the longstanding businesses that serve the area. W.D. Chapman butchers has been in Woodford since the 1920s, with its earlier location on Chingford Lane dating back to 1875.



Sue, who has been a cashier at W.D. Chapman butchers for 44 years, said "My family have always lived here, but lots of families are now moving here. I can see why, as being so local to Epping Forest has such huge appeal."



Sophie (pictured left) said "The people are nice and it's a very safe area. The schools here build good character and it's an amazing place to grow up, I wouldn't want to move out."

### Woodford Bowling Club



Kathleen said "I love the sense of community here as I seldom walk down the street without bumping into someone I know. I'm part of quite a few WhatsApp community groups and it's great being able to keep in touch with those who live nearby. The proximity to the Central Line is also a big bonus."

# Transform your life, through adult education

Sarah Sea returned to the classroom after 25 years – and you could too!



Returning to work after a long break can feel like a daunting challenge. Whether it's due to personal circumstances or a long period away from the workforce, it can be difficult to regain confidence and skills. This was the position Sarah found herself in, after spending a considerable amount of time as a long-term carer for her son. However, after receiving the right support and resources from Redbridge Institute, she was able to overcome these obstacles and restart her journey from learning to employment.

Reflecting on her journey, Sarah said **"Being a** long-term carer for my disabled son was a full-time job. Over time, I lost my confidence and struggled with life. I desperately wanted to get back into work, but I found I had completely deskilled myself. I finally plucked up the courage to enrol at Redbridge Institute of Adult Education on a bookkeeping course, followed by a series of employability workshops, including CV writing, how to complete an application form and digital skills.

I was extremely anxious and nervous returning back to the classroom after such a long time. The tutors were amazing and instantly put me at ease. I very quickly realised how much I loved to learn, which inspired me to do better, grow as an individual and get into the workplace.

I received support to help me find a job, which has helped me enormously to overcome my social and emotional challenges."

# **Selective Licensing Schemes**

If you're a Landlord or Agent and you operate any rented property, you may need to apply for a property licence.

Redbridge Council has two selective licensing schemes in place. Selective Scheme 3 (2 wards) has been in operation since 1 November 2023 and applies to rented properties within Ilford Town and Valentines wards.

Selective Scheme 4 (15 wards) came into force on Monday 8 April 2024. The wards affected are: Aldborough, Barkingside, Chadwell, Churchfields, Clementswood, Cranbrook, Fairlop, Goodmayes, Hainault, Loxford, Mayfield, Newbury, Seven Kings, South Woodford and Wanstead Village.


These schemes require landlords or agents of most private rented properties in these areas to apply for a selective property licence. To apply, visit https://propertylicensing.redbridge.gov.uk/


If you already have a selective licence for a property in these wards and it is still in date, the licence will remain in force until the expiry date shown on the licence.

These new schemes were introduced after a full public consultation and confirmation by the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC), who were satisfied that these schemes will contribute to an improvement in general housing conditions in the areas, and that private rented housing in the designated area is experiencing high levels of deprivation, high levels of migration, and significant and persistent antisocial behaviour.

Failing to get a property licence can result in receiving a civil penalty of up to £30,000 or prosecution in Court, where the fine is **unlimited**. Additionally, not having a property licence may prevent you from evicting tenants using the 'section 21' process. Tenants may also be able to claim back up to 12 months' rent from you, via a Rent Repayment Order (RRO). The Council will normally publish any prosecutions, enforcement, or legal action in the press and update the GLA's public Rogue Landlord and Agent Checker and government intelligence databases.

# We're helping our older population reduce falls and stay safe

### New technology, piloted by Redbridge Council, is leading the way nationally

Trips and falls can be unpleasant for anyone, but they can be especially harmful and dangerous for the elderly. Falls affect many people aged over 65 each year, often leading to reduced mobility, illness and loss of independence.

That's why we're proud to be leading an 18-month pilot project aimed at reducing falls among the elderly, by introducing exciting new technology.

The government-funded project will see us work with technology companies, who create products designed to make the lives of elderly people safer and more enjoyable. These technologies include balance aids and fall detection systems, and will be used in care homes, private homes, and retirement homes. We will support older people to improve their digital skills, and discuss how they can make positive changes in their lives to work with the new technology so it can play a role in improving health. By the end of the project, we're aiming to help make elderly people safer, healthier and more independent, while reducing pressure on emergency services.

Cassandra Christie, Operational Manager at Oakfield Lodge retirement home said "Informetis' InfoCare technology is amazing because it detects movement without cameras and sends information to a dashboard which carers and family can view. It gives residents their privacy, families peace of mind, and carers a better understanding of residents' movements. Some residents feel less lonely thanks to the Monica MiiCube's verbal check-ins and reminders."





Michael Feldman, a local resident who is using MiiCare, said "Monica is really useful. I have reminders set up to order my evening meals, my repeat medications and do my exercises so I don't forget them. I also like the watch as I can monitor my health and steps with it."

# We are here for you

It can sometimes feel impossible to leave an abusive relationship, but Reach Out can support you to start again, if you need it

A local person had experienced years of physical, emotional, sexual, financial, spiritual and technological abuse from her partner. After trying to leave the relationship a few times, but without support to be able to live independently, she made the decision to contact Reach Out for help. Warm, friendly and dedicated to supporting local people who are being abused in their relationship, the team at Reach Out gave their help to this person, without adding any pressure, and always going at the pace they wanted.

The team helped this survivor clear significant rent and council tax arrears, which amounted to almost £60,000 debt. They arranged school placements in a new area and secured the family's electronic devices so they could no longer be tracked. They provided financial support for essentials like new furniture and the team worked with another borough to secure a property in a new area.



The survivor said "I had previously made attempts to leave but ended up returning as I did not have the right support. That all changed when I received the pivotal support from the Reach Out team. Their help has been an allrounder, from dealing with my accommodation issues, debt solutions, financial support and our welfare in general. The adjustments have been a challenge, but manageable with the support of the involved professionals. We were made to feel comfortable, welcome, appreciated and without judgement. I want to say a big thank you to the Reach Out team."

# Supporting families at the end of their lives

### We're increasing burial plots to support our communities in their time of need

It's never easy to talk about the end of life, but it's important. It helps ensure our families and friends are supported and that everything is in place when needed.

To help support this, Redbridge Council and its contractor, Westerleigh, has expanded the burial plots in the borough, helping more people to lay their loved ones to rest close to where they live.

In a population that's grown over the years we need more space, which would run out in the next decade if it's not expanded, and we need to ensure we have the right facilities for those who need them. That's why we're expanding burials in Redbridge for both religious and non-religious groups, and making sure each has the facilities they need. The Leader of the Council, Cllr Kam Rai, met with local representatives of the Muslim community where space for 500 dedicated burial plots are being provided.

We met with representatives from our Hindu, Sikh, Christian, Jewish and Muslim faiths communities, so we could make sure everyone's needs could be met as we reviewed the bereavement service in Redbridge.



### **Gas canisters**

#### Inhaling gas from canisters is dangerous.

These canisters contain nitrous oxide (commonly known as laughing gas) and are often emptied into balloons before being inhaled. Nitrous oxide can affect both the spinal cord and the



nerves in the arms and legs, resulting in loss of feeling, abnormal sensations, varying degrees of limb weakness, and even paralysis.

Parents can help protect their children by looking out for gas canisters like the one shown above. Please be vigilant about what arrives at your house in the post.

#### Littering from cars

There is no excuse for throwing litter out of your car window. Our roads are not one giant litter bin.

If you're a vehicle

owner, and someone in your car throws rubbish out the window, **YOU** will be fined **£100**.

Think of your local community - keep your borough clean and your fast-food rubbish in your car until you can dispose of it in a bin.

Councillor Jo Blackman, Cabinet Member for Environment and Sustainability, said **"Every year, we collect over 100,000 tonnes of rubbish, recycle over 30,000 tonnes and keep more than 1600 pavements clean. But we can't do everything. We need your help to keep our borough clean and running smoothly."**

# Stop dumping rubbish

With our award-winning parks and green spaces, outstanding schools, and bustling high streets, Redbridge is a place we can all be proud of and should strive to protect.

However, a minority of selfish individuals and their antisocial behaviour are impacting the quality of life for our communities.

We're talking about the people who think it's acceptable to fly-tip old mattresses or furniture, the neighbours whose front gardens are a mess with rubbish and old junk, and those who dump rubbish on private land.

We've been working tirelessly behind the scenes to target these offenders.

#### Mayfair Avenue, Ilford

The landlord placed waste in the front garden next to the neighbouring property, who contacted us due to the foul smell. We worked with the landlord and ensured he disposed of the waste.





You can now face a £1,000 on-the-spot fine for fly-tipping.

#### **Cleared! Guildford Road**

This property had rubbish overflowing onto the highway, (pictured top right). Our staff spoke with the resident and issued a Community Protection Notice. Upon their return visit, all rubbish had been cleared.

#### **Cracking down on fly-tipping**

Fines of more than £1,000 were issued after several drivers failed to produce a valid waste carriers licence.

Cllr Khayer Chowdhury, Cabinet Member for Community Safety and Enforcement, said **"We will continue to crack down on those who think it** 



down on those who think it's acceptable to fly-tip and dump rubbish wherever they like without punishment.

"We will do everything in our power to identify and prosecute those responsible, but we also need residents to play their part by keeping their neighbourhoods clean and tidy and reporting any issues. If you can send us photos or videos of fly-tippers in the act, it gives us a greater chance of identifying them."

Over the last two years, we've taken nearly **600** people to court for environmental offences.



# Redbridge is getting safer

Redbridge Council has supported the Police to reduce crime across the borough



#### We are seeing big reductions in some crimes – and that's official.

Recent crime figures show a significant reduction in the number of offences compared to the previous 12 months. There are fewer cases of violence, drug crimes, and crimes against women and girls in Redbridge.

Robbery, including mobile phone theft, has also dropped. This reduction is a testament to the work our police partners have been doing with our support in crime hotspots across the borough.

We have been supporting the Police with our extensive CCTV and Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) camera network, a highly effective tool in reducing and deterring crime.

CCTV recently played a key role in the arrest of five individuals involved in a violent incident at JD Sports on Ilford High Road. The CCTV team overheard a distress call about a gang steaming incident - a type of shoplifting where criminals threaten staff and steal high-value items. This gang had been linked to similar crimes across east London. The team quickly redirected cameras to cover escape routes while providing police with footage and suspect descriptions. Thanks to their swift coordination, the police were able to apprehend and arrest the gang.

The Council works closely with the police to further lower crime in the borough. The Leader of the Council meets regularly with the borough's police commander to discuss ongoing issues, provide support where possible, and ensure the police are held accountable for their work in tackling crime.

To help keep our borough safe, it's important to report crime or suspicious activity to the police.

Cllr Khayer Chowdhury, Cabinet Member for Enforcement & Community Safety, said "We want people to feel safe and secure in our borough, so we're pleased that we've seen a notable reduction in some crimes. Every ward in Redbridge has a dedicated Safer Neighbourhood Team. Please get in touch with your local police team, who can address anti-social behaviour and other crimes in your neighbourhood."

### Benefits

We can help local people check they're receiving everything they're entitled to. They hold drop-in sessions and offer home visits. The team can identify unclaimed benefits from central government, helping to reduce financial stress for local people, and increase their income. In 2024, they secured £513K in additional income for local people.

### **Pension Credit**

If you're eligible for Pension Credit, we can support you to claim it. Last year, we helped local people claim an additional £252,000. Pension Credit unlocks further benefits, such as Council Tax Reduction and free TV licenses for people over 75, so it's important to claim it if you're eligible.

We want to ensure you're accessing everything that's available to you, to help improve your financial stability and wellbeing.

# Brick by brick, we're building for the future We're almost there! Our goal of building 600 new homes for local people who need them most, is nearly a reality

In Redbridge, over 3,000 people are living in temporary housing, and 8,000 are waiting for a council home. We're committed to changing that by building more homes for the local people who need them the most. By the end of 2025, we will have built 600 new council homes across the borough. These will include one, two, three and four-bedroom properties, which will be available for people on our housing waiting list to rent.

#### Last year, we made great progress towards our goal. Here's how we're providing local people with a home.

Last year we helped people move out of temporary accommodation into homes they could live in, in the long-term.

To do this, we bought homes for local people to rent from us, in areas they can afford. This means sometimes these homes are outside the borough, and although the move can feel daunting, most people we've helped have been happy to have a stable home for their family. Another 121 homes were built by partnership providers in Seven Kings and Manford Way, which will also be rented to people on our Council house waiting list.

We have completed housing developments, including Mossford Mews, Little Gearies and Heathcote.





For Dace and her daughter Jasmine, it's been a long journey to finding permanent accommodation. Dace said: "We have been living in temporary accommodation since May 2017, and this is our third, but hopefully last, move. Our previous accommodation was okay. We had space, and even a small garden. But then in October 2023 we received another eviction letter from our landlord. It can be worrying not knowing where you're going to end up. We got the offer of a flat at Little Gearies in October 2024 and moved in at the end of the month. The flat is very spacious and warm with a balcony, and the rent is affordable. The surrounding area is pleasant and peaceful. Our new place offers us stability without having to worry about eviction letters from landlords. # Avoiding getting behind on your rent

### If you are worried and are struggling to pay your rent, please do not ignore the problem. Support is there for you



The rent service team

Managing rent and other expenses can be hard, especially during tough times. It's easy to ignore the problem, but this can make things worse, and you can risk owing more money, or even losing your home. Our rent service team can help you if you need it, by providing personalised, nonjudgmental help, based on your individual needs and situation.

When we know of our tenants who are at risk of falling behind on payments, our staff help by checking if they have applied for the correct benefits, offer help with applications, and address property issues.

They help tenants prevent and solve rent problems, by building financial stability so people can manage rent payments whilst paying off arrears. They do this by making sure tenants are getting all the income and benefits they're entitled to and help to agree on a reasonable monthly payment to clear any debts. They work closely with tenants to identify any extra support they may need and can connect them with other council services or volunteer and advice organisations.
