It's also the perfect time to blow away some of the winter cobwebs, go out and explore some of the fantastic parks and green spaces we're fortunate to have here in Redbridge.


With summer on the not too distant horizon, we're also looking forward to the arrival of Mercato Metropolitano, a fantastic offer of good food and community events. This is a vital part of our plans to develop and transform Ilford into a vibrant destination of choice.

Some of you might be aware that we set and agreed our budget last week for the next financial year. The crucial thing is that we have delivered a budget that will continue to invest in key services to help improve the borough for you, (pages 16 & 17).

And this is despite the fact we've had to save more than £180 million in just under ten years – a staggering amount of money that could have been spent on vital frontline services for residents.

We've put aside £18 million to ensure we provide compassionate care to some of our most vulnerable residents; to continue to try and do our bit to solve the London housing crisis and keep our neighbourhoods and streets clean and safe. In addition, we will be investing £10 million in our roads and highways.

Protecting vital services and investing in what matters to you



In the coming weeks, you will also notice the emergence of a new multi-agency taskforce dedicated to tackling crime and anti-social behaviour in and around Ilford Town Centre. The frontline team of 17 will provide high-visibility evening and late-night patrols, seven days a week, and will be made up of council enforcement officers and the police.

It gives me great pleasure to announce that Project Malachi is now up and running – a groundbreaking initiative to help tackle homelessness for those people with no recourse to public funds. It's so rewarding to see how an idea that we first put forward six years ago has finally reached fruition. I'd like to say a big thank you to everyone who has played a part in helping make this vision a reality. There is absolutely no reason why people in modern society should be faced with the prospect of sleeping rough. That is why we will continue our efforts to eliminate rough sleeping in the borough.

I look forward to catching up with you all in the summer – and have a Happy Easter.

Redbridge businesses one of the first in UK to benefit from fast charging hub for electric vehicles thanks to £250k grant

Businesses in Redbridge will have access to a fast charging hub for electric vehicles, thanks to a £250k grant aimed at tackling air pollution in the borough.

The hub, one of the first of its kind in the country, is being created at the council's Ley Street Depot in Ilford, and will feature at least four fast charging points, capable of fully charging an electric vehicle in under an hour.

Targeted towards local businesses, the landmark scheme aims to encourage more companies to switch to electric vehicles, and is one of a range of environmental and air quality improvement initiatives coming into force around Ley Street, as a result of the funding.

The pot of money was awarded through the Mayor of London's Air Quality Fund, after the borough successfully bid to form a Business Low Emission Neighbourhood (BLEN) in and around Ley Street in Ilford.

Initiatives under the project include widening the cycling lanes along the northern section of Ley Street leading up to the A12, installing extra cycle stands and adding more greenery to provide a natural barrier against vehicle emissions for pedestrians.

They will be delivered over a three-year period.





AVOID THE THREE-CUP SCAM

Shoppers visiting Ilford Town Centre are being warned to avoid the three-cup scam illegally being operated by street gamblers, and are advised not to participate as that will only encourage further scammers to the area.

The three-cup act is a scam, involving several people aimed at deceiving unsuspecting victims out of their money.

The Council's enforcement teams and the Police are working to target these individuals. If you have been a victim of this crime please report by calling 101 or online via the Met Police website.

Join us in making the Redbridge Equality Pledge

Redbridge Council became one of the first local authorities in the country to officially commit to fighting discrimination with the launch of the Redbridge Equality Pledge during Holocaust Memorial Day.

Hundreds attended the event this year as communities came together to remember Jewish people murdered during the Holocaust under Nazi persecution, as well as all those who have suffered in genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur.

The council took up this year's theme of Standing Together to emphasise its commitment to preventing inequality by unifying local communities with the Equality Pledge. The pledge calls on everyone to consider how they can make their own personal contribution to fairness and equality by asking signatories to set out how they will help make Redbridge more inclusive.





Cllr Jas Athwal, leader of the council said:

"The Redbridge Equality Pledge is our way of showing our commitment to making our area welcoming, inclusive and fair. As a council we have values which we are proud to adhere to and we are asking our partners, residents, neighbours and friends to share those values.

"Everyone can make a commitment towards helping make sure we are all treated equally and fairly by others, regardless of our race, gender, religion, sexuality, or disability – giving us each the freedom to be who we are."

Partnership team's mission is cleaner streets



We're stepping up our fight against litter, dog fouling and anti-social behaviour after we launched a new enforcement team, and it's already showing results.

The council has joined forces with contractor Local Authority Support (Kingdom) to clamp down on those who do not clean up after their dogs, and litter the borough. As part of the partnership, we have introduced more uniformed street patrols which are out daily, and can identify hot spot areas and issue fines, when necessary.

In the first month of the scheme our patrols had issued over 1,300 fixed penalty notices for a range of offences, from spitting and dog fouling to dropping cigarette butts, cans and tissues, to keep our streets cleaner.

Yusuf Patel MBE

Yusuf Patel is passionate about his role as community engagement officer at Redbridge Council – and his commitment was recognised when he was awarded an MBE in the Queen's New Year Honours.

Yusuf was recognised for working tirelessly to bring communities together and tackle extremism through grassroot initiatives. He has organised various community events, including a groundbreaking exhibition on Muslim heroes of the Holocaust and events commemorating the massacre of Bosnian Muslims during the Srebrenica genocide. He works with the most vulnerable communities to challenge violence against women and girls and to empower women from Black, Asian and minority ethnic backgrounds to become involved in public and civic life.

Wheelie bin pilot is rolled out

Around 7,000 households have received wheelie bins as part of a pilot to replace black sacks for rubbish.



Redbridge Council introduced the pilot scheme to try to keep the streets cleaner and encourage people to recycle more. The move was decided after a survey in October 2018 showed the majority of residents favoured having a bin to store their rubbish and agreed that we should do more to tackle waste in the community. A wheelie bin should make putting rubbish out much easier.

Pilot areas were chosen to be representative of the borough so the bins can be tested to make sure they work as intended.

Councillor John Howard, Cabinet Member for Civic Pride, said:

"A key aim of the scheme is to keep our streets cleaner – containing rubbish in a wheelie bin will prevent animals and birds ripping open bags and making a mess in our streets, which is unpleasant for everyone and costly to clean up. Using wheelie bins for rubbish will also help keep people's front gardens clean.

"We're testing the scheme to make sure that the bins reduce refuse tonnages and work for householders as intended, and we're eager to hear residents' views."



Residents, businesses, police and the Council have all been busy with the community campaign to clean up Ilford Lane, and through hard work, more and more people are falling in love with this bustling destination.

The Lane provides the ideal combination of shopping and socialising all in one place through its vibrant mix of 325 independent shops, eateries and businesses.

These include jewellers, bakeries, restaurants, saree designers, soft furnishings, cafes, fresh produce suppliers, hardware stores, motoring supplies and service-led outlets such as dry cleaners and nail bars.

One of the most appealing aspects of Ilford Lane is its accessibility, through convenient on-street parking bays and popular bus routes. It may only be just over one mile long, but The Lane has more independent businesses than anywhere else in the borough, as 216 new traders launched their business there within the last five years.

Local resident Eamonn believes Ilford Lane is "a local diverse and vibrant community, where residents and visitors can feel safe. This is helped by the visible presence of the police and Redbridge Enforcement Officers."

Fly-tippers pay the price for selfish actions

People who dump rubbish illegally have been counting the cost of their selfish behaviour.

Redbridge Council is clamping down on fly-tipping and in the past few months has brought several successful prosecutions, with culprits having to pay out hundreds of pounds in fines and charges.

Among them was a woman from Havering who was charged £577 after appearing at Barkingside Magistrates' Court. Su Larcombe from Collier Row admitted leaving three bags of her boyfriend's rubbish in Grasmere Gardens and Woodford Avenue. She was fined £143, and ordered to pay costs of £360 and clear-up costs of £42. A victim surcharge of £32 was also imposed.

Another fly-tipper, who illegally dumped the contents of a garage, ended up nearly £2,000 out of pocket.

Mohammed Khan, 35, of Ripplegate Walk, Barking, was spotted on security TV emptying the bulky

contents into a residents' bin area on the Ray Lodge Estate, Woodford Green.

In court he admitted that he and his brother had disposed of the waste from his late father's garage store room, as he was selling the property. Both men pleaded guilty to flytipping. Each had to pay a fine of £1,384, the council's costs of £417.50 and a victim surcharge of £138, totalling £1,939.75.

Cllr Jas Athwal, the Leader of Redbridge Council, said: "Redbridge is our home and no one has the right to dump their rubbish on our streets. Our enforcement team will track them down and we will prosecute.

"Our message is simple. Those who choose to ruin our local environment will be caught and they will face the consequences of their selfish behaviour."

Redbridge first in the UK to offer pioneering family therapy service for young people at risk of joining gangs

A ground-breaking new family therapy service aimed at preventing and reducing youth crime has been launched in the borough.

It is the first time the innovative Families Functional Therapy-G service – branded as Families Are Forever – has been delivered outside of the US, and will offer a bespoke family therapy programme for families where young people are deemed at risk of becoming involved in gangs.

The borough will be working in partnership with Cambridgeshire based company, Family Psychology Mutual, to deliver the therapy sessions to eligible families.

Under the programme, a specialist clinical therapist will work with the young person and their family, over a three to five-month period, to build on relationship strengths to overcome negative patterns of behaviour.

Families Are Forever was given the green light, following a successful bid by the council and Family Psychology Mutual for £781,055 through the Youth Endowment Fund.

Cllr Elaine Norman, Cabinet Member for Children and Young People said:

"Deterring young people away from gangs and criminality is an absolute priority for us.

"We want to give our young people the best opportunities and start in life, as well as the support they need, when they need it.

"This innovative new service will help us provide the support and expertise needed to intervene where young people have been identified as being at risk of gang involvement and exploitation."



Capital Letter Housing

Work to help homeless families in Redbridge is taking a further step as the London-wide Capital Letters scheme gets underway.

The council has joined 12 boroughs in the innovative scheme to provide extra homes for residents at risk of becoming homeless. Backed by nearly £38 million of government funding, Capital Letters allows the council to lease more homes and ensure vulnerable families have safe, long-term and stable housing options. £5 million centre for homeless people opens in Ilford

A brand-new £5million centre to help tackle homelessness in Ilford, East London, has opened its doors to help those in need of a roof over their heads.

Project Malachi is a joint venture funded to the tune of £5million by the Salvation Army and Redbridge Council. The building is made up of 42 self-contained flats, finished and decorated to provide safe and comfortable homes. It is also the first of its kind to specifically support rough sleepers who have No Recourse to Public Funds (NRPF) in this way.

Malachi Place offers a radical new approach to help people escape a life of rough sleeping, creating a new kind of homelessness hostel, with an integrated bicycle refurbishment social enterprise.

Malachi Place will provide year-round accommodation and support for people who have been sleeping rough. The Salvation Army will provide specialist 24-hour on-site support for residents to help them deal with the many issues that led them to sleeping rough, like domestic violence, childhood trauma, relationship breakdown, as well as mental ill health.

"It is fantastic that Malachi Place is now up and running – a ground breaking joint initiative to help tackle homelessness for those with no recourse to public funds.

"It is so rewarding to see how an idea that we first put forward six years ago at a council committee has finally reached fruition. I'd like to say a big thank to you to everyone who has played a part in helping make this vision become a reality. There is absolutely no reason why people in modern society should be faced with the prospect of sleeping rough. That is why we will continue our efforts to eliminate rough sleeping in the London borough of Redbridge."

Chigwell Road temporary housing opens

People have now moved into the new temporary accommodation in Chigwell Road, South Woodford, a council housing scheme to accommodate more than 100 homeless residents.

Councillor Farah Hussain, Redbridge Council's cabinet member for housing and homelessness, said: These new homes in South Woodford are just one way we are tacking the housing crisis in the borough.

"We have a rolling programme to purchase 300 homes over the next few years and a joint project with other London boroughs to secure accommodation for people in need. The council is also directly delivering 600 council houses for local families.

"This housebuilding programme will account for a large part of the council's strategy to build 1,000 affordable homes by 2022, and means it will become the largest provider of new social homes in the borough."

Redbridge Council's Customer Voice initiative has continued to grow, with the website's chatbot getting more intelligent, more transparency and data sharing to improve services and a brand-new area on the website making it easier than ever to share issues.



Customer Voice was launched in 2018 and the Council have been focussing on developing new ways of working and improving services based on customer feedback and data. As a result, stronger communities can be built and better conversations can be had, both digitally and face to face, to benefit and support residents.

Newly developed corporate complaints and insights data is now available to residents on the Redbridge Council website and in-depth monthly analyses have been rolled out across services to identify key areas of improvement. This data will be used to galvanise change and help recognise the root cause of complaints in order to solve any underlying issues.

Upgrades to the chatbot hope to engage residents by making it simple to report faults and complain without having to call the Contact Centre, which will free up call centre staff to deal with complex enquiries. The chatbot has already helped reduce the number of telephone enquires about bin collections by 25 per cent and more reductions are expected with the increased functionality.

Cabinet Member for Transformation and Engagement Cllr Helen Coomb said: "We're really keen to find new ways to engage with our residents and improve the customer experience. It's clear the chatbot has proved a real hit with our residents, who have benefited from a simple, quick and clear route to the information they need. Importantly, the reduction in the volume of calls to our contact centre following the launch of the bot has enabled customer service staff to concentrate on the more complex enquiries raised with us. The project's success has reinforced our belief that digital technology can improve the services we offer and we will now be looking to explore the potential of chatbots to help with our engagement."

A brand-new area of the website, dedicated to making it easy for customers to tell the Council what's wrong and what's right with services, has been designed to simplify and streamline the process of raising issues with services. These pages will signpost residents to the quickest way to resolve a problem and a new complaints form will make it easier for the authority to identify the best immediate solution for an issue as well as recognise larger areas of improvement within the service and the Council as a whole.

A BUDGET THAT DELIVERS FOR THE PEOPLE OF REDBRIDGE

Redbridge Council has once again committed to investing in key services to help improve the borough for its residents.

Redbridge Council has been recognised as a high-performing, low spend council that has arguably been punching above its weight for some time, especially considering the level of savings it has been forced to make over the past decade, as the Deputy Leader, Councillor Kam Rai, Cabinet Member for Finance and Resources of Redbridge Council explains:



"Redbridge has seen an average 63% reduction in funding over the past decade. This means we've had to save more than £180m in just under ten years – a staggering amount of money that could have been spent on vital frontline services for residents."

"Government funding hasn't taken into account that demands have increased in Redbridge. We have the eighth lowest-level of funding per head of population of any unitary council in the country, and are among the lowest-funded councils for both adults and children's social care."

"Despite these huge pressures, residents still wake up in the morning to see their bins picked up every week; all libraries and parks in the borough remain open, we continue to protect our most vulnerable residents and we are supporting the police in keeping people safe and tackling anti-social behaviour."






These are just of some of the investments Redbridge Council is making in the coming year and beyond.

A total of £17.4m will be invested in improving our roads and highways



The Council is planning to invest £17.4m into roads across the borough, including £13.5m of funding for road resurfacing with the remaining £3.9m to be invested in improving the condition of existing highways.





Investing in education and in services to keep our most vulnerable children, young people and adults safe

This money will ensure that we provide compassionate care to some of our most vulnerable residents and invest in their education.

Housing

We will continue to build new council housing and affordable properties to address the historically low levels of social housing in the borough. Including the purchase of temporary accommodation to help tackle the housing crisis until we can find residents a permanent home in Redbridge.

The hub, one of the first of its kind in the country, is being created at the council's Ley Street Depot in Ilford.



Through wise and innovative investment, Redbridge Council will renovate Ashton Playing Fields in Woodford Bridge. Redbridge Council will also continue the transformation of Hainault Forest County Park, in partnership which the Heritage Lottery Fund, and deliver the new swimming pool in Wanstead.


Community hubs take shape – with help from you


The Seven Kings community hub is working towards being part of a planning application to be submitted in spring, so we held a co-design workshop recently bringing together local residents, council service leads and NHS representatives to agree on layout options. In Gants Hill, a joint panel of residents and council staff have appointed architects to undertake



a feasibility study of the Gants Hill site which will run from now until the summer. The successful architects, RCKa, will be working with local people and leads from the council and NHS. We will shortly be inviting people to apply to be on a community stakeholders group, which will also be advertised through council channels.

Behaviour changing initiatives to be rolled out in Redbridge to help tackle prostitution in the borough



Redbridge has been given the green light to trial initiatives aimed at changing the mindset and behaviour of local people engaging in prostitution, thanks to a £20,000 grant.

The funding boost from the Local Government Association (LGA) will support the council in developing and implementing initiatives aimed at changing the attitude and behaviour of those soliciting prostitutes in the borough.

By changing the behaviour of those who purchase sex locally the council is hoping to see a long-term improvement to the local environment in South Ilford, while also helping reduce the need for regular enforcement action.

The LGA grant is in addition to a raft of successful measures already in place to help tackle prostitution and support women, who are often victims, to move away from this type of harmful and dangerous life.

This includes increased police and council enforcement presence on Ilford Lane, the use of CCTV and ANPR cameras and the ground-breaking Public Space Protection Order (PSPO), which bans attempts to buy sexual services from another person in a public place.

The PSPO empowers enforcement officers and police to issue on-the-spot fines to those caught breaching the order.

The council will now work towards a plan for the grant funds to explore, test and evaluate methods of changing behaviour. This includes a range of initiatives from developing messaging for campaigns, leaflets, community engagement and display boards to community champions. The aim is to change views so that those soliciting prostitutes understand that:

- women engaging in prostitution are often victims of trafficking and coercion, who would choose a different life
- there is a lack of consent if the person being paid for sex is trafficked and being forced into prostitution.

The goal is to also shift the community's mindset by changing their anger towards women involved in prostitution into an intolerance towards the men in the community who are driving the demand for the service.

Leader of the Council Cllr Jas Athwal said:

"We're already doing a lot of good work tackling prostitution in the borough, working closely with the police and local community, and have seen a huge decline in on-street prostitution.

"However, it's equally important to focus on changing the mindset and behaviour of those engaging in this type of practice to ensure a shift in attitude that will help deter local people from purchasing sex to begin with.

"We very much welcome this grant and will put it to good use, building on the excellent work we've already delivered by putting initiatives in place that focus on changing people's behaviour."

Clare, a member of the local Residents' Group said:

"Tackling this kind of issue is quite complex, and there needs to be more than just one approach, which is why the community, police and council are trying to work together on this.


"I think an additional more informative approach to tackle attitudes and behaviours of those engaging in prostitution is a great step forward in finding more long-term solutions for the area.

"It's about educating people about the criminal element of what they are doing, how it affects lives and neighbourhoods, and ensuring people really understand the consequences of their actions on not just themselves, but also others."

The council was awarded the LGA grant under the Behavioural Insights Programme which encourages innovation in local public services to help people make better choices for themselves and society.



Knife retailers in the borough join crackdown on underage knife sales

Redbridge retailers have been pledging their support for a pan-London initiative to stop illegal, underage knife sales.

The borough's Trading Standards team, in conjunction with the police, have already signed-up 16 stores to the London Responsible Retailers Agreement (RRA), with others being urged to follow suit.

The initiative follows on from a series of successful test purchases carried out by the trading standards team which showed 97 per cent of traders that were tested in the borough refused to sell a knife to a customer without proof of age – one of the most successful rates across London.

Under the RRA, which is being rolled out across the capital with a focus on smaller, independent stores, retailers pledge to:

- understand the basic requirements for the safe storage of knives
- follow the ASSESS-CHALLENGE-CHECK process for selling age-restricted goods
- know when and how to contact police with suspicions of knife crime or where staff feel threatened by customers

The initiative was developed jointly by London Trading Standards (LTS), the Metropolitan Police and the Mayor's Office for Policing and Crime (MOPAC) to help restrict access to knives for under 18s.

Leader of the Council Cllr Jas Athwal said: "The Responsible Retailers Agreement is an important step forward in restricting access to these dangerous weapons for under 18s, and I urge all our local knife retailers to sign up to it. Blue badge fraud convictions

We are among the top local authorities in the country for securing blue badge fraud convictions.



The council's crackdown on blue badge fraud has led to it being ranked as one of the best in the UK for securing convictions against those using the permit illegally.

Figures released by the Department of Transport ranked Redbridge in the top 11 for boroughs across the country that successfully prosecuted against blue badge fraud last year.

Redbridge only started its campaign against Blue Badge fraud last year, making the league table ranking all the more impressive.

As part of the on-going campaign the council has checked hundreds of badges, with most cases brought to court involving people using someone else's badge to avoid paying for parking.

Prosecutions brought to court by the council last year included a passenger who was also fined alongside the driver after the duo found themselves in the hot seat for misusing the permit in the borough. Other successful prosecutions have also resulted in driving bans. Redbridge Council is taking a tough stance against this type of crime to ensure the protection of its disabled parking provision.

Cllr Helen Coomb, Member for Transformation and Engagement said: "I'm really proud of how far we have come since starting our campaign last year, and we are not stopping so let that be a warning to those using blue badges illegally in the borough.

"There are robust rules in place to ensure that blue badges are not misused. The permits are issued to people who face real difficulty in getting around and are a vital lifeline."

Blue badges should only be displayed if the Blue Badge holder is travelling in the vehicle as a driver or passenger, or if someone is collecting the Blue Badge holder or dropping him/her off and needs to park at the place where the Blue Badge holder is being collected or dropped. Misuse is a criminal offence and can result in a maximum fine of £1,000.

'Keeping it real' Knives and our children

The number of young people carrying knives across the borough is rising, and Redbridge Council is asking parents, carers and the community to more aware of the problem. As the chances are your child has talked about knives with friends, or heard a story about the kid who carried a knife.



Talk to your child/teenager about the law and the consequences of carrying a knife

- Carrying a knife is illegal, and carries up to four years in prison
- Police are legally allowed to stop and search a young person if they believe they are in possession of a weapon
- A criminal record could stop your child entering university, getting a job, or travelling
- Carrying a knife increases their own risk of being injured and seriously hurting someone else

TIPS TO HELP IDENTIFY KNIFE CRIME

- Know what knives you have in your kitchen and home
- Be aware of any online purchases or searches for blades
- Regularly talk to your child and be engaged with their social media
- If concerned, search their bag, bedroom or other potential hiding spaces in your home
- Remember it might not be a knife but another weapon
- Know where they are, know their friends and know where they are visiting

Improving the borough's air

Redbridge Council is reminding people of some of the simple steps they can take to improve air pollution levels in the borough.

Air pollution is currently a major concern, both locally and nationally. The financial cost of air pollution for the UK currently stands at £20 billion per year – an enormous amount of money.

Poor air quality is damaging to our health, but particularly young children and those with heart and lung problems. Being exposed to air pollution during pregnancy, and after birth, may affect the development of a child's lungs. It can also trigger serious conditions, including heart disease, and can worsen illnesses, such as asthma.

In response to this, Redbridge Council has already introduced clear air zones at Fairlop Primary School and Saints Peter and Paul's Primary School and Gordon Road Primary School last year.

The clean air zones were implemented to reduce levels of air pollution around our schools; help protect children from traffic at the school gate and to encourage more children to walk and cycle to schools.

School clean air zones mean vehicle traffic is banned from travelling past schools at the schools' start and finish times during term time only.



Cabinet Member for Civic Pride, Councillor John Howard added:

"It was only announced that the ban on the sale of new petrol, diesel and hybrid cars is to be introduced in 2035 – five years earlier than previously planned.

"We are now at a critical stage and fast approaching a point of no return. It is therefore essential that we act now to improve London's toxic air to try and limit the damaging effect on the lungs of our children, young people and elderly residents."







These are just some of the simple steps you can take to improve air quality and residents' health.

- Travel by public transport
- Avoid driving and parking
- ✓ Walk on the side streets
- Avoid walking alongside busy roads
- ✓ Cycle or walk to work
- Ventilate your home when cooking or cleaning



Residents can also sign up for free airTEXT alerts, which give forecasts for today and tomorrow of pollution, UV, grass pollen and temperature. The airTEXT app is available for iPhones and Android smartphones.

Are you caring for somebody else's child?



If you are looking after someone else's child or if your child is being looked after by someone else you might be part of a private fostering arrangement.

Private fostering is when a child or young person aged 16 or under (or 18 if they are disabled) is cared for by an adult who is not a close relative for more than 28 days.

A private foster carer may be:

- a friend of the family
- the parent of a friend of a child
- an extended family
- someone previously unknown to the child's family who is willing to privately foster a child

Help us to keep children safe and support families by notifying us of private fostering arrangements. If you are a parent or carer of a child who is being member such as a cousin, privately fostered you have a great aunt or great uncle legal duty to inform your local council. If you don't you might be missing out on free advice and support.





The Council has made clear its intentions to lead the broader regeneration of Ilford town centre, in improving the street scene and image of Ilford high road.

The Council is committed to improving the quality of the public realm for Ilford and its vision for the future of Ilford is articulated within the Ilford Manifesto "Ilford for All" and Regenerating Ilford – Delivery Prospectus.

Ambitious plans will create new high-quality, accessible public spaces. Alongside the arrival of Crossrail, the major street improvements will help to fundamentally revitalise Ilford Town Centre.

Phase 1 of the public realm works completed in December 2018 and comprised the pedestrianised part of Chadwick Road and part of the High Road fronting the Ilford Exchange. Phase 1 has been well-received, with bike racks and benches enjoying considerable use throughout the day.

Phase 2 works will involve the transformation of Ilford Town Centre. The second phase will renew the stretch of public realm along the High Road,

connecting the Crossrail Complementary Works (CCM) to the junction of Cranbrook Road, along to Clements Road and a spur into Oakfield between Cranbrook Road.

Metis design Consultants Ltd was procured in April 2019 to develop the scheme, procure and manage the contractor, to include on-site supervision throughout the duration of the build. Development of Phase 2 has included extensive community and stakeholder engagement throughout the summer, taking into account feedback from Phase 1, and seeking views for the phase 2 concept designs, and additionally embrace our ambition to become a child-friendly borough.

The works include the laying of 5-colour palette granite paving matching that laid in Phase 1 outside the Ilford Exchange and Chadwick Road. The works will provide areas for children's play features, art exhibits, additional tree planting and rain gardens/planters, as well as enhanced street furniture and provision for market stalls.

Before the main works start, anticipated summer 2020, there are requirements to carry out preconstruction activities, to start March 2020, to upgrade the lighting in the town centre and

put in the necessary ground works infrastructure. The new lighting columns will include CCTV cameras to support increased surveillance for the town centre.

The contractor and Council will ensure the Town Centre remains 'Open for Business' throughout the construction phase and businesses and the general public pedestrian flows are not affected. The works contractor will open a pop-up shop by May 2020, for members of the public to see the high road designs and speak to the site supervisor on progress and answer any questions.

The Phase 2 public realm project will transform the town centre to promote a diverse range of activities in the town centre, including street art, outdoor performance and gallery space to create a safe, accessible and interactive environment for residents, shoppers and visitors during the day and evening. Envisaged as a smoke free zone, the town centre will promote health and sustainability, and contribute to improved air quality. Play features have been designed to encourage children and young people to be active, and trees and benches will offer shade and moments to pause in the town centre.





State-of-the art CCTV and ANPR cameras, funded by Redbridge Council, are helping to take offenders, knives and drugs off the borough's streets.

A recent police and council ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) operation in South Ilford led to nine arrests and 58 car stops within four hours.

During the operation, Redbridge Police recovered knives, apprehended an individual wanted for burglary and a male wanted for serious assault and for forcing a woman into prostitution. The police also retrieved a stolen moped, recovered Class A and B drugs and £16,000 in laundered money, as well as seizing two uninsured cars.

Leader of the Council Cllr Jas Athwal said: "We recognise how tough it has been for the police in recent years with significantly less funding from central government. That is why we invested £1.5 million last year in CCTV and ANPR cameras across Redbridge to tackle all forms of crime and improve community safety. Our investment is starting to have the desired effect, tackling crime by targeting and apprehending criminals.

"Further ANPR operations like this will help to take more offenders, knives and drugs off our streets and deter criminals from visiting Redbridge."

The 41 newly installed ANPR cameras across Redbridge are operated in partnership with the Metropolitan Police to target and apprehend offenders and tackle crime in the Borough. The Council's 24/7 CCTV control room links up more than 250 cameras, and over the past three years, has assisted in thousands of arrests.
